1:00 PM - 2:00 PM PLENARY: TARGETED UNIVERSALISM AND BRIDGING

Targeted Universalism is a rapidly growing model for achieving equity, developed by internationally recognized legal scholar, humanitarian, and thought leader john powell. At the core of the model are the assumption that we need to shift mindsets to address systemic inequities and the fundamental belief that all of us equally belong to our society and that we all deserve to thrive. The path to belonging is bridging, which, according to powell, "requires that we create space to hear and see each other" and is a key step to addressing the polarization and divisions that prevent our collective progress. Bridging is at once simple to grasp and challenging to put into practice. In this conversation, powell and a distinguished panel will talk about Targeted Universalism and the concept of bridging, how they have practiced it both professionally and personally, and the opportunities and challenges they have encountered.

A. The Deepest Levers of Change – Minds, Hearts, and Relationships

Experience has taught us that equitable systems change doesn't happen because organizations implement better interventions or governments create better policies. Systems transformation happens when we work collectively and on different fronts, because no single intervention can accomplish change on its own. To move beyond the incremental, we need ways of working together that are deeper, more exploratory, and more disruptive. John Kania and Junita Zerda will offer a framework outlining the conditions that hold social and environmental problems in place, and they propose a new way forward that engages and supports the cultural and relationship dimensions of systems change. They will be joined by LaVerne Srinivasan who will share her experience and insights as a funder working to put these principles into practice.

Systems transformation is complex and requires years to implement; progress can be difficult to measure. 2:45 PM – 3:45 PM PLENARY: EQUITABLY TRANSFORMING EMPLOYMENT IN AMERICA

The latest data on income inequality in America paints a bleak picture of inequity – particularly along racial lines. This panel will explore what changes are necessary to equitably transform the US employment system, and why the results would benefit the entire economy. It will also explore what it looks like when the corporate sector acts to end injustice and economic disparity. OneTen, a coalition of over 150 companies, that, over the next 10 years, will upskill, hire and promote one million Black Americans who do not have a four-year degree into family-sustaining jobs with opportunities for advancement. One Ten is also about something bigger; in its own words, OneTen seeks "to shatter systemic barriers and create economic opportunities for Black families in America."
